SCAN Foundation Summit Focuses on Long-Term Services & Supports

Changing California's system of long-term care was the focus of The SCAN Foundation's (SCAN) Long-Term Services and Supports Summit, held September 27 in Sacramento. Bringing



together representatives from State Government, advocacy organizations and providers, the summit provided an opportunity for SCAN to introduce the results of its long-term care scorecard in the context of policy discussions about making services better. "...now is the time where policy solutions can focus on making California's system of care much more person-centered and better organized for individuals with needs, their family caregivers, and the providers who serve them, instead of only contemplating programmatic cuts," said Bruce Chernoff, M.D., President and CEO of The SCAN Foundation.

Local Senior Coalition Reviews Impacts Of State and Federal Safety-net Cuts

The impact of state and federal budget cuts is the subject of a series of recent summaries released by the Senior Services Coalition of Alameda County. Distributed by the Insight Center for Community Economic Development, the information summarizes the 2011 State Budget cuts and the subsequent changes to critical safety-net programs. "The damage to California's five life-line programs has happened in a landscape of lost capacity," said Coalition Director Wendy Peterson, noting that four years of reductions have diminished or eliminated all state funding for ADHC, IHSS, SSI/SSP, MSSP and MediCal -- programs that are essential to California's most vulnerable older adults and persons with disabilities. The coalition also addresses the risk of potential cuts at the federal level, where Older Americans Act programs face threats in ongoing budget deliberations. 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
SENIOR-FOCUSED LEGISLATION APPROVED BY GOVERNOR

Governor Jerry Brown has signed a number of important bills to improve services and protections for older adults and persons with disabilities. Following is a brief list of those bills. - SB 33 (Simitian) Elder and Dependent Abuse. Chapter 372 signed on 9/13/2011.
